







US Health Expenditures as a Percent of GDP



- Through 2008, America's health was poorer than the average of peer nations in these areas:
 - Infant mortality and low birth weight ,
 - Injuries and homicides,
 - Adolescent pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections,
 - HIV and AIDS,
 - Drug-related deaths,
 - Obesity and diabetes,
 - Heart disease,
 - Chronic lung disease,
 - Disability

• Despite American mortality being among the lowest 3rd of OECD nations for cancer and cerebrovascular disease, Americans are in the worst 3rd of OECD nations for mortality related to transportation accidents and infant mortality.



 Yet Americans continue have the highest percentage of its citizens (89.5%) reporting "good" perceived healthcare when compared to 34 other OECD nations.


